

Mrs. Dixon's DOUBLE CHEESE WAFERS

(Mrs. Hudson borrowed this recipe from the housekeeper of Bob Carruthers' Chilton Grange in the Adv. of the Solitary Cyclist.)

1 c. grated Cheddar cheese 3/4 c. butter ½ clove garlic, minced 1/3 c. bleu cheese 1 tsp. chopped parsley 1 t. chopped chives 1/2 tsp. salt 2 cups sifted flour

Cream butter & cheeses. Add remaining ingredients. Shape in 12" diameter rolls, and chill well. Slice & bake in 375° oven for 8-10 min. Makes 3 dozen.




SCANning the Scion Scene
