

No Dummy, Sherlock

"Dummy boards" were used as a type of home security in the 1800s. A flat board was cut into an outline of a person, with details usually painted on. The dummy board was then placed near a wall so it would cast a shadow in the candlelight. times just a dummy board face was placed behind curtains in a window. The whole idea come from the Netherlands to Britain in the late 1700s. Men, women, children, servants in uniform and even dogs were depicted on these decoys.

Of course, Sherlock wanted to have the illusion that he was home, and he figured the villanous Colonel was wise to the dummy board, it having been around for a while. So he commissioned a 3-dimensional "dummy board face" and convinced poor Mrs. Hudson to keep it moving.
