In Holmes' time the great majority of British newspapers were run on very conservative lines; scandals involving the rich and famous were rarely reported, and if they were, the reporting was as decorous as the circustances would permit.

In the late twentieth century, we live in the times of the tabloid press. The rich and famous are fair game, and the screaming, attention grabbing headline, the more scandalous the better, is the rule rather than the exception.

In the headlines of todays 'gutter press,' the substance of the matter is frequently submersed by its seamier aspects, every possible insinuation of sexual impropriety emphasized, and scandal hinted at. whether it is there or not ...




