

BLANCHED SOLDIERS OF NOAH 4TH ANNUAL MEETING

DIOGENES DOINGS

On April first, the PPoF held
a Diogenes Club event at the
Tampa Museum of Art to view
the exhibit on show: "The
Defining Moment, Victorian
Narrative Paintings from the
Forbes Collection," and a
dramatic visitation from HRH
Prince Albert and HM Queen
Victoria. There was a picnic in
the park next the museum.
Quiz sheets on the Sherlockian
references in the paintings
were handed out.

After perusing the exhibit, the royal pair arrived, played by Maureen Patrick and Michael Norton, on loan from the "Victorians Undressed" series at the Henry B. Plant Museum across the river. They were very well dressed for the parts: the Prince sporting long sideburns and a Chesterfield coat (suddenly popular at the Oscars, we note); the Queen in a hoop skirt. And they were well prepared on their subjects. The Prince expounded on the glories of the Crystal Palace and the Oueen on art developing culture, with personal examples from Balmoral. The Oueen stressed the uplifting and instructional value of the exhibit, while the Prince emphasized the need

for government patronage of the arts and his own privy purse.

Taking a risk on audience questions, the pair did rather well extemporaneously, answering diplomatically regarding the unpleasant situation obtaining in the American Civil War, the insidious introduction of French ideas of abstract art, and the proper rearing of children to be seen and not heard (a compliment to the Dow Family).

The exhibit itself had many fine examples of Victorian style with many canonical allusions. "Til Death do us Part" might have been a photo snapped at Hattie Doran's wedding. "Trust Me" was right up Milver- (cont. page 4)

IN MEMORIAM

Flowers were sent in the name of the PPofF to the gravesite of Rondo Hatton on the occasion of the anniversary of his birthday, April 22, 1894. Rondo Hatton was born in Hagerstown MD, and moved to Tampa as a baby with his family. He was a

member of the American Expeditionary force in WWI and was gassed in France. From this exposure, it is surmised that he developed acromegaly, a disease that caused his facial features

to become grossly distorted.

1894-1946

He was a reporter for the Tampa Tribune in 1943 when he was spotted by a Hollywood scout in town in the days when movies were shot here. He was persuaded to move to California and appeared first in the Basil Rathbone series' "Pearl of Death" in 1944 as the murderous servant to Gail Sondergaard: "The Hoxton Creeper". He reprised this role as Mario in "Spider Woman Strikes Back" in 1946, again paired with Ms. Sondergaard.

He made several other movies using the Creeper persona, being billed as the horror actor who needed no makeup. He died of a sudden heart attack, perhaps related to his disease, Feb 2, 1946. Despite his disfigurement, he was universally known for his cheerful personality. His horror-movie career was just taking off when he died, or he might have been in the pantheon with Karloff, Lugosi, et al. He is still a "cult" figure to fans of the horror genre.

Rondo Hatton is buried in the American Legion Cemetery located at Dale Mabry Hwy.and Kennedy Blvd. in Tampa. Fans of his have begun a tradition of the annual observance of his birthday. The PPofF is happy to join in this remembrance of a local figure who in his own way, contributed to the Sherlockian legend.



Conned Again, Watson: Cautionary Tales of Logic, Math and Probability by Colin Bruce (Perseus Books \$24) has Holmes and Watson thwarting criminals and con men with the aid of statistics and game theory in amusing stories penned by Bruce, a physicist.



Originally written as a partwork in *The Strand Magazine*, and intended as an entertainment, the original story is nonetheless based on Sir

Arthur Conan Doyle's experience of his visits to Dartmoor in the early twentieth century. Few other works of fiction have fomented so much controversy with accusations that Conan Doyle stole the story from a friend - even that he murdered the story's real author!

At last, here is a serious study of an important fictional masterpiece, linking the influences of the moorland landscape, its
