### Holmes and Watson, Xena and Gabrielle

One of the more popular syndicated series over the last few years has been *Xena:* Warrior Princess. For those of you unfamiliar with the series, it concerns a woman who was formerly a savage warrior



bent on the complete destruction of her opponents. For years she and her

army battled against opponents in order to satisfy her lust for power and destruction.

As the series opens, Xena has lost this tremendous hunger. She is heading back home to Amphipolis to make amends. On the way, she defends a village against a raiding warlord. Gabrielle, a spirited young woman who is bored with her village life and the prospects of a loveless marriage, follows Xena and eventually attaches herself to her, hoping to find life and experience the thrill of adventure. Xena is annoyed at first, but when Gabrielle shows her determination and her strength, she becomes more of a partner.

A simple vehicle for mayhem? This is a distinct possibility as in each episode there is the obligatory fight scene (or two or three). Xena, quite often with Gabrielle's assistance, inevitably defeats the enemy or enemies with a maximum amount of

stuntwork, blood-curdling war cries and pumped-up sound effects.

But is there more than perhaps meets the assaulted-by-special-effects eye? I think so. Consider these parallels between the Canon and the Warrior Princess:

- Gabrielle is a writer, a scribe, recording their adventures on scrolls. In their travels, they come across many people who know of Xena through Gabrielle's writings.
- Xena has a dark side, the warrior in her that she is constantly trying to suppress. She is trying to use her powers to right the wrongs she has committed in the past, to make the world slightly better than it currently is. Holmes himself remarked in CHAS, "...I have always had an idea that I would have made a highly efficient criminal." Is Holmes' darker side closer than he would like to admit?
- Xena has commented several times that she would be lost without Gabrielle.

(continued from page 2)as a distant relationship, evolves into a closeness and respect for each other that goes far beyond adventure. Watson shows his extreme respect for Holmes when he says the great detective was the "best and the wisest man whom I have ever known." And Holmes would be lost without his Boswell.

- Although they are not solving mysteries, they are looking for and promoting righteousness, honesty and justice—things that Holmes champions time and time again. The two "fight to protect the powerless even as they struggle with their own inner demons." Could this sound any more like a bored Holmes turning to his hypodermic needle?
- Xena battles the gods, while Holmes battles evil. Xena eventually concludes that the gods are no longer relevant, that they are keeping humans ignorant and in need. She decides that they must be destroyed. Similarly, Holmes is trying to rid the world of crime and its consequences.
- Both Xena and Gabrielle have died and have been reborn. At the end of the



fourth season, both women are crucified by the Romans—hey, they get around. Their souls ascend into heaven where they and the archangels battle



against the demons of hell. The eventual outcome is that the pair are returned to the living. Holmes fell to his death at the end of FINA and is resurrected in EMPT.

Comic relief has come in the form of Joxer, a bumbling freelance soldier who traveled quite often with the two. Lestrade offers a foil for Holmes superb intellect, just as Joxer offers a foil for Xena's superior fighting abilities.

Certainly there are vast differences: Roman Europe vs. Victorian England; trips to the Elysian Fields and Valhalla instead of Dartmoor and Sussex; Amazons instead of Baker Street Irregulars; cyclops, sheiks and centaurs instead of ship captains, Bohemian Kings and blackmailers.

Alas, the adventures concluded after 60 stories. So too shall Xena at the end of this season. However, just as Holmes and Watson live on in paperback and Doubleday reissues, so too shall Xena and Gabrielle live on in reruns.

VIOLET walks to the couch, collapses crying. HOLMES and WATSON collide with each other trying to get to VIOLET. They slap and trip each other as VIOLET sobs. Finally, HOLMES pushes WATSON into the wall—a bust of Napoleon tips from side to side and then falls on WATSON—and rushes over to VIOLET'S side and kneels. HOLMES: What is it? How can we help you? VIOLET (crying) It's my husband. I just...just don't know if....

HOLMES: You don't think he loves you anymore, do you? Why that no-good, dirty little—I'll moiderize him.

VIOLET: No, it's not that. He's in awful trouble. But it's not his fault.

HOLMES: Of course, it isn't his fault. I could tell that the minute you came here. The way your hat looked.

VIOLET: My hat?

HOLMES: Yes. Y'see, you wore it cocked to your left side. If you wore it to the back, that would mean that he was taking some kind of youth potion. If you wore it to the right side that would mean that he was employing some red-headed lackeys. If you wore it forward, that would mean that he found a treasure at the bottom of the Thames.

He boxes HOLMES' ears, hits him under the chin. HOLMES waves his hand in front of LESTRADE'S face, then slaps him. LESTRADE punches HOLMES in the stomach; when he doubles over, he hits HOLMES in the forehead.

Meanwhile, WATSON is talking with VIOLET. She smiles, and HOLMES notices. LESTRADE swings his fist, but HOLMES leaps toward VIOLET and LESTRADE's momentum carries him into the table, knocking the silverware all over the floor. A fork embeds itself into WATSON'S hand.

HOLMES: So the cleaning crew has had the last few days off.

WATSON: More like the last decade.

A very tall BUTLER enters from another door and picks up two of the bags. He is completely deadpan. LESTRADE (reacting to the BUTLER): Ang-ang-ang-ang.

The BUTLER walks through the extravagantly decorated yet dusty living room with the bags. LESTRADE follows him but is distracted by a huge portrait that looks vaguely like WATSON.

WATSON: So where do you suppose the jewels are? HOLMES: You heard Mrs. Baskerville. They're somewhere in the house.

WATSON: But where?

HOLMES: We will use our deductive reasoning powers to figure this out. If I were a jewel where would I be?

WATSON: I know: on a finger.

HOLMES: Jewels, you moron, not jewel.

WATSON: But you said "jewel." HOLMES slaps WATSON again.

WATSON: I know, I know, stop observing.

HOLMES: We'll have to search this place from top to bottom.

WATSON: But that could take days-weeks.

What about our other clients?

HOLMES: Our other clients aren't the Baskervilles.

WATSON: How do we know Old Lady Baskerville is on the up-and-up?

HOLMES: Because she said so. And she's not so old.

The BUTLER returns, picks up two more bags and retraces his steps. LESTRADE runs over to him.

LESTRADE (grabbing the suitcase) Hey, that's my bag. No one touches it but me.

The BUTLER does not release his grip.

LESTRADE: Oh, a wise guy, eh? Ruff, ruff.

He backs up, runs at the BUTLER, misses him and sprawls into a chair, knocking it over.

WATSON: I don't get it, Holmes. If the Baskervilles are so rich, then why do they own a dump like this?

HOLMES: Elementary, my dear moron. The Baskervilles don't want anyone knowing that they are so rich.

WATSON: But everyone already knows.

HOLMES glares at WATSON. WATSON slaps his own forehead.

Behind him, LESTRADE is hanging onto the BUTLER'S back as he is going up the stairs, still trying to pry the suitcase out of his hands.


HOLMES: We'll start tomorrow searching through the house.

WATSON: I'd rather start tonight. This place gives me the creeps. The sooner we get out of here the better as far as I'm concerned.

LESTRADE, now at the top of the stairs, slips off the BUTLER'S back and falls down the staircase. He stands, groggy, wipes (Continued on page 7)

WATSON sits down in a chair and it immediately collapses. He stands up, goes over to the fireplace.

WATSON: Maybe the jewels are in the flue. He gets down on his hands and knees and looks up into the fireplace. He pulls on the damper, causing black dust to fall on him. As he stands up, his torso completely black, LESTRADE runs in through the front door, completely wet.

HOLMES is completely oblivious to all this as he takes out a calabash pipe and stuffs it full of tobacco. He lights a match, tries to light the tobacco. It doesn't work, and he goes through five matches. As WATSON walks up, he blows through the pipe, spitting tobacco into WATSON'S face.

Unfortunately, or perhaps fortunately for Watson's forehead, the screenplay ends here. We suspect that the jewels Mrs. Baskerville is trying to find are stolen and that she isn't really Mrs. Baskerville at all. When they locate the loot, she steps in with a gun. But Lestrade's ongoing feud with the butler results in her getting knocked into the moat. The portrait of Watson's ancestor, however, is fodder for another episode.—Eds.
