




Television evangelist Joseph Stangerson announced that he was leaving his show after allegations that he was an avid guncollector. "Outrageous," was his only comment.



McPherson in Wes Craven's *Taste the Blood of the Lion Fish*. "He's a very complex man," Ford said, "a quiet man of science with a checkered past."


