There is an eccentric new generation of crime fighters in prime time - brilliant, obsessed and, if not dysfunctional, then at the very least are damaged. They modern descendants of the detective story's greatest hero. Sherlock Holmes. Mentioned are William L. Petersen's Gil Grissom (C.S.I.), Vincent D'Onofrio's Robert Goren (Law & Intent). Order: Criminal Cavanaugh Hennessy's Jordan (Crossing Jordan) and Tony Shalhoub's Adrian Monk on (Monk).

Like Holmes, they spend their lives solving puzzles. And when the game is afoot, they delight in putting the pieces together. But take away their puzzles and they are left alone with their demons. Though they may not use a 7% solution of cocaine to ward off the ennui, they're still lost in what another detective, Raymond Chandler, once called "a darkness more than night."

"Holmes only needed the drugs when he wasn't working," said Mr. Shalhoub. "When Holmes was engaged in a case, his brain was on fire and he was doing what he was born to do. The same is true for Monk. When he latches onto some important detail in a case, he's free of all his phobias and neuroses and at least for that moment is at peace."

Monk seems to be plagued, by every neurosis and phobia known to man, including fears of germs, heights, crowds and milk. Andy Breckman, an executive producer of the show and its head writer. admitted that he did more than borrow a detail or two from Conan Doyle in fleshing out the show's detective hero. "It's almost as if I used a Xerox machine," he said. In fact, he states that all three of the show's main characters are lifted straight out of Doyle: Monk; his nurse, Sharona (Bitty Schram), who is his Watson; and Captain Stottlemeyer of the San Francisco Police Department (played to exasperated perfection by Ted Levine), who is their Lestrade of Scotland Yard.

"Monk is like Holmes," Mr. Breckman said, "in that he is the most gifted guy around and the most troubled. He's just not happy out in the world. Everything is just in such disarray that he can't deal with it."

What's most important, according to Mr. Shalhoub, is that Monk, in his apartment or out solving crimes, remains fundamentally alone." As totally dependent as he is, Monk pretty much exists by himself," he said.

None of those neo-Holmeses are sympathetic in the conventional sense. And they go beyond the traditional "hard-boiled" detectives of pulp fiction to a more extreme state of existential isolation. Mr. Shalhoub acknowledged that this was not only rare for television, but also risky."What intrigued me so much about Monk was this idea of

creating a character who was really annoying, who was really irritating and got on your nerves," he said. "I worried about whether audiences would sit still for this kind of character. But now I've come to embrace it."

### THE GAME'S STILL AFOOT WITH HOLMES

The big budget remake of the classic mystery "The Hound of the Baskervilles" airing this Sunday on PBS's "Masterpiece Theatre" gives proof that Sherlock Holmes remains one of the most recognizable and enduring fictional characters ever created. His exploits have even spawned a group of devotees who gather in cities all over the world every January to celebrate the birthday of "the world's greatest consulting detective."

The biggest meeting is always in New York, and features more than 200 Sherlockians from as far away as Japan and Switzerland (their international Web site is www.sh-whoswho.com). They come together for five days of scholarship, sleuthing and socializing.

Holmes hobbyists take their passion seriously. Learned papers address unresolved questions in the "canon," or the 60 original Sherlock Holmes stories published between 1887 and 1927. Induction into the 69 vear-old Baker Street Irregulars, whose members have included Presidents Franklin Roosevelt and Harry Truman, is open only to those who have contributed significantly to the understanding of Holmes and the Victorian age he "lived in." Indeed, an amusing conceit of some Sherlockians is that Holmes and his detecting partner Dr. John H. Watson actually lived. In their view, the man credited with their creation. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, was in reality Watson's opportunistic literary agent, who unfairly took credit for chronicling Holmes's adventures.

Those who don't yet qualify for admission to the Baker Street Irregulars dinner hold a rowdier New York event on the same evening called the Baskerville Bash. This year's affair featured a takeoff on Groucho Marx's "You Bet Your Life" with appearances by such costumed characters from the canon as "The King of Bohemia," interspersed with reports from CNN -- the "Canonical News Network."

Outside of their festivities, Sherlockians only rarely sport the distinctive deerstalker hat, cape and meerschaum pipe that Holmes favored. David McCallister of Tampa, Fla., did don his outfit for a walking tour of Manhattan last week and was stopped by a young black man. The fellow told the astonished Mr. McAllister that his real name was Sherlock Holmes, and he whipped out a driver's license to prove it. "Holmes fans know boundaries. internationally no or culturally," Mr. McCallister observes.

Membership in Holmes societies overwhelmingly male until recently, but there's now a large female contingent in groups such as The Adventuresses of Sherlock Holmes. Mia Stampe, a physicist from Denmark, says that women are completely welcome among Holmes devotees, and that she received

In sorting all this out the play mixes humour and suspense in equal amounts, leading to a stunning final twist which will surely catch audiences by complete, and breath-stopping surprise. The Deerstalkers had the opportunity to meet with the cast after the play and compare costumes and congratulate them on a fine performance! A great time was had by all!
