FIRST ANNUAL PLEASANT PLACES OF FLORIDA FILM FESTIVAL

Hound of the Baskervilles Featured



"Mr. Holmes, they were the footsteps of a gigantic hound!" With these words, uttered by Dr. Mortimer at the conclusion of Chapter 2. Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson were drawn into an adventure that many have considered the greatest mystery story ever written: The Hound of the Baskervilles. These words brought chills to the spines of the attendees at the FIRST ANNUAL PLEASANT PLACES OF FLORIDA FILM FESTIVAL that took place on August 23, 2003 at the beautiful new Seminole Community Library.

13 members of the Pleasant Places of Florida were joined by 9 guests, drawn to this momentous occasion by wonderful publicity in the St. Petersburg Times. We were privileged to experience two excellent examples of cinematic treatments of this epic story as well as a wonderful film that demonstrated and critiqued all of the many attempts to present this tale.

First shown was the 1939 20th Century Fox first class production starring Basil Rathbone as Sherlock Holmes, Richard Greene as Henry Baskerville, and Wendy Barrie as Beryl Stapleton. Among many well-known character actors playing supporting roles was Nigel Bruce as Dr. Watson. Originally intended to launch the career of the 19-year-old Greene as a leading man, the portrayals of Rathbone and Bruce set the stage for an entire series of Sherlock Holmes movies featuring these actors, establishing them as the prototypical Holmes and Watson for several generations.

The 1959 Hammer Studio version followed. Known for producing eerie Gothic horror films featuring Dracula, Frankenstein's monster, etc., they attempted with some success to infuse these effects into The Hound of the Baskervilles. Although somewhat successful in this regard, the arbitrary addition of a poisonous spider scene and a seance detracted from the flow of the film. On the other hand, their depiction of the really bad guy, Hugo Baskerville, was excellent. Sherlock Holmes was well played by Peter Cushing, with credible performances by Andre' Morell and Christopher Lee as Dr. Watson and Jack Stapleton, respectively. (Continued on page 2)



SHERLOCK HOLMES REFERENCES ARE EVERYWHERE

Noted in the St. Petersburg Times for Tuesday, Sept. 2, 2003 (Floridian Section) was John Freeman's critique of a book entitled The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time by Mark Hadden. Unlike Dr. Watson's story Silver Blaze, from which the title was lifted, this is a novel concerning an autistic savant's ability to solve a mystery regarding the murder of a neighbor's dog by a garden tool. According to the critical review, "the Curious Incident depicts how investigating this petty crime forces our hero to participate in the world around him."

And the St. Petersburg Times for Friday, Aug. 22, 2003 carried an obituary by Bill Adair entitled "a rare bird." The author states "Roxie Laybourne liked fast cars, stiff drinks, and hard science. The ornithologist died recently at 92, having made air travel safer. "What has this to do with Sherlock Holmes?" one might ask. Well, just as Sherlock Holmes kept careful records of the minutiae that he used to solve crimes, for example his monograph on 140 types of tobacco ash, Ms. Laybourne kept extensive records regarding the identification of birds based on feather samples and other evidences. Working for the Smithsonian as an expert on birds, she also served the air plane industry by deducting which birds had been the cause of problems by, for example, being sucked into the engines of jet aircraft. This knowledge enabled airplane designers to reformat engines or remove dangerous birds from the vicinity of airports. She was also, like Sherlock Holmes, a free spirit. According to the article, "Roxie trapped rabbits and cooked them in the dorm" and "She was the first student at Meridith to wear blue jeans." Further evidence for her connection to our great detective is the fact that one the girls she mentored was named Lorenzo Baskerville.

There are several sites on the Internet that enable discussions among Sherlockians.

Regina Stimson sent me information regarding an available chat room or message board available to AOL members. According to Regina, "AOL members can get to our chat room or message board by using Keyword: Mystery Fiction and checking the appropriate links. This link takes members to the message board; Holmes, Sherlock." She states they discuss all levels of fiction, and that it is a very friendly group.

A very well-known Sherlockian on-line discussion group is the Hounds of the Internet, a corresponding scion of the Baker Street Irregulars. To subscribe to the Hounds of the Internet, send a message to the following E-mail address: LISTSERV@LISTSERV.KENT.EDU. Leave the subject line blank. Send this message from the E-mail address at which you wish to receive postings from the Hounds of the Internet: subscribe HOUNDS-L. You will receive a detailed response regarding this Listserver based discussion group. For further information, access following web site: http://www.bcpl.net/~lmoskowi/hounds.html.

Another excellent on--line discussion group is WelcomeHolmes that is run by the Nashville Scholars Sherlock Holmes Club. Just go to http://groups.yahoo.com/group/WelcomeHolmes/ to access their web site for information and links to join their discussions.

Finally, we come to the news group alt.fan.holmes. To get signed up, you need to create a new account on your server, and then, you can subscribe to alt.fan.holmes. This process is too complicated to describe in a few words, and varies between E-mail programs. I suggest using of your "Help" menu, phoning your service provider, or inviting a computer literate friend over for cocktails.
