FICTIONAL DETECTIVE'S FANS

HOLMES, SWEET HOLMES

ALL FANS THE WORLD OVER SHARE THEIR PASSION FOR THE FICTIONAL DETECTIVE SHERLOCK HOLMES. TROPICAL DEERSTALKERS IS ONE SUCH GROUP

It's elementary, my dear. the Tropical Deerstalkers, the South Florida chapter of the Sherlockian Baker Street Irregulars, are indubitably a cerebral, entertaining group. "We have exciting fun together, like literary Trekkies. It's a passion," said Debbie Turbert, director of outpatient services at Miami's Jackson Memorial Hospital, during a recent meeting at the Grand Palms Hotel Spa & Golf Resort in Pembroke Pines.

Sherlockians are fans of the four novels and 56 short stories about the famed Victorian-era detective Sherlock Holmes, written from 1887 to 1928 by Scottish physician Sir Arthur Conan Doyle.

Doyle died in 1930, but his fans, known as Sherlockians, persisted by forming groups. One such organization, founded in New York in 1934, was the Baker Street Irregulars, whose membership consisted only of people able to complete a Sherlock Holmes trivia crossword puzzle.

Dr. Robert Ennis of Weston, an orthopedic surgeon and the president of the 75-member Tropical Deerstalkers, said more than 700 Sherlockian groups, called scion societies or "offspring," now exist worldwide. The United States has about 140 scions, with the Tropical Deerstalkers one of only two in Florida, he said.

"We come from all different professions, like writers, doctors, lawyers and law enforcement officers," said Ennis, who sported a deerstalker cap much like the one worn by Sherlock Holmes in renderings found on the pages of Doyle's books.

Ennis said members do not join but are invited. Some groups have definite personalities, such as a scion made up entirely of undertakers, another that is called upon to assist police with cold case investigations, and yet another dedicated to philanthropy.

Members have four things in common: They enjoy mysteries, are natural observers and sleuths, are Doyle fans and Victorian era buffs.

In fact, Ennis is not referred to as the president of the group, but the "gasogene" (also spelled gazogene). During Victorian times, the gasogene was a gadget used to force gases into water to create seltzer. The group's vice president, Francis Turbert, is called the "Tantalus," which was a cabinet used in upper-class homes at the turn of the 20th century to keep alcoholic beverages safe from thieving visitors and servants.

"So, now you have it. Our president is full of gas and I am the keeper of the spirit," said Turbert, a Pembroke Pines registered nurse and husband of Debbie Turbert.

Members abide by two important rules: They regard Sherlock Holmes as a real person, born Jan. 6, 1854, and they maintain the illusion that Doyle was merely the literary agent for the diaries of Holmes' loyal assistant, Dr. Watson, through whom the stories are told.

Ennis said meetings of the group, established in 1979, take place every three months at places revealed as the meeting dates draw close.

Meetings open with grand toasts to characters from Doyle stories.

After a discussion about a certain Holmes text or a character analysis, guest speakers talk on mystery and intrigue. Past guests have included a code buster, a gemologist, and a DNA expert.
